











History Museum of Mobile

111 South Royal Street

Over 20,000 square feet of artifacts, text, audio, video, and hands on interactives in the History Museum of Mobile bring Mobile's history to life. Our special exhibition galleries also change periodically so visitors discover something new with each returning visit.





Colonial Fort Condé

150 South Royal Street

Colonial Fort Condé is a modern replica of the French fort that once stood in the same location over two hundred years ago. This 4/5 scale section of the fort serves as a museum for Mobile's Colonial history.





Phoenix Fire Museum

111 South Royal Street

The Phoenix Fire Museum traces the history of firefighting in Mobile from its beginnings to the present. Visitors can explore antique fire trucks and fascinating equipment.





Clotilda: The Exhibition

Africatown Heritage House is the home of *Clotilda*: The Exhibition. This exhibition tells the story of the 110 remarkable people who survived the voyage of the *Clotilda*, the last known slave ship to enter the United States. The exhibition highlights their West Africa beginnings, their time of enslavement, their creation of the Africatown community, and the discovery of the shipwreck.

School Programs

School tours are led by museum staff and are available for visitors from preschool through high school. Tours require a minimum of 10, and a chaperone is needed for every 10 students. Tours are available Monday through Friday between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. All tours must be scheduled at least two weeks in advance. Large groups may need to visit the museum in shifts.

Tours may be selected from those listed on the next couple of pages. We can also collaborate with educators to create a tour that is suitable for students with special needs. Tours and school programs were developed to support Alabama Course of Study Content Standards.

Eye Spy Scavenger Hunt

1 hour (Preschool - 3rd Grade)

This visual scavenger hunt is designed with young learners in mind. On this artifact finding adventure, we teach students about museums and how they care for the artifacts in their collections. Students also try the museum's interactive exhibit components. When the scavenger hunt is completed, all students get a small prize!



Footsteps Through Time Scavenger Hunt Tour

1.5 hours (4th Grade - 8th Grade)

This scavenger hunt through the permanent exhibit, *Old Ways, New Days: The Story of Mobile*, is designed for cooperative learning. Students discover Mobile history by working together to find the answers to the questions in the exhibit. The tour can also include the museum's upstairs thematic exhibits. When the scavenger hunt is completed, all students get a small prize!



Permanent Exhibits Tour

1.5 hours (9th Grade - 12th Grade)

This is a lecture-discussion tour of the museum's permanent exhibits. Students will also have the opportunity to try the museum's interactive exhibit components.

Special Exhibition Tour

1/2 - 1 hour

The type of tour and the grade levels that it is appropriate for will depend upon the exhibition. See the final pages of this planner for the exiting exhibits on display this year!

Behind the Scenes Tour

1/2 - 1 hour (9th Grade - 12th Grade)

This tour will get an exclusive look at the museum's amazing Collection Storage Area. Group size is limited to 15 students, 2 chaperones are required.

Phoenix Fire Museum



Housed in the restored home of the Phoenix Volunteer Fire Company No. 6, the Phoenix Fire Museum includes turn-of-the-century horse-drawn steam engines and early motorized vehicles. The gallery on the Second Floor recounts the history of the volunteer fire companies of Mobile from their organization in 1838. Groups that exceed 40 people (including teachers and chaperones) will need to visit the museum in shifts.



Guided Tour

1/2 hour (Preschool - 12th Grade)

Students will learn about the history of firefighting in Mobile and discover antique fire trucks and equipment.

Phoenix Fire Museum Scavenger Hunt Tour

1/2 hour (Preschool - 3rd Grade)

On this artifact finding adventure, we teach students about what museums do and what artifacts are. Students then look through the Phoenix Fire Museum's exhibits to find special artifacts. When the scavenger hunt is completed, all students get a small prize!







Colonial Fort Condé



Guided Tour

1 hour (4th Grade - 12th Grade)

Discover Mobile's colonial era history at Colonial Fort Condé. The original fort was built in 1723 by French colonists. The replica fort and museum sit on the same site as the original fort and opened in 1976 as part of the nation's bicentennial celebration.

Go on a guided tour of the fort's exhibits to see artifacts from Mobile's colonial past and then go atop the fort walls to see unmatched views of Mobile's skyline. The guided tour includes the fort museum, grounds, and 2nd floor observation deck. Living history demonstrations are now included with a guided school tour of the fort.












EVENT: Colonial Day 2025

Making History Classroom Program

Students visit the museum classroom to complete a take-home project that will complement their tour. Education staff members facilitate the lesson. This option costs just \$1.00 per student.



Quilt Squares (1 hour)
Recommended grades K-6

Students will learn about the designs, symbolism, and historical significance of quilts as they create their own quilt square.



Trade Beads (1 hour)
Recommended grades 3-9

Students will learn about the history of trade beads and their significance in the colonization of the New World as they make their own trade bead bracelet.



Quill Pens (1 hour)
Recommended grades 3-9

Students will learn about the history of writing as they make their own quill pen and then put it to the test.



Marbled Paper Activity (1 hour) Recommended grades 4-12 Students will learn the history and secrets of the ancient art of paper marbling and then use authentic methods to make their own marbled paper.

Recommended grades 3-9

HISTORY BASED ACTIVITIES BROUGHT TO YOUR CLASSROOM!

Each activity supports Alabama Course of Study content standards for Social Studies and/or Visual Arts. We will bring the necessary supplies to your classroom, and we set up and conduct the activity. Choose from one of the five options listed below.



Quilt Squares

Students learn about the history of trade beads and their significance in the colonization of the New World and then make their own trade bead bracelet.





Clotilda: The Exhibition AFRICATOWN HERITAGE HOUSE

Africatown Heritage House is a new site of the History Museum of Mobile located in the heart of historic Africatown adjacent to the Mobile County Training School and the Robert L. Hope Community Center. This museum is the home of Clotilda: The Exhibition which tells the story of the 110 remarkable men, women and children who endured the voyage of the last known slave ship to land in the United States. The exhibition highlights their beginnings in West Africa, their time of enslavement, and their creation of the settlement of Africatown. The last part of the exhibition is about the discovery of the sunken schooner. Pieces of the Clotilda, recovered from the shipwreck, are on display in the exhibition and are on loan from the Alabama Historical Commission. The exhibition has been curated, developed, and designed in conjunction with the local community and the wider descendant community, and in consultation with experts around the country. The Mobile County Commission and the City of Mobile funded the museum's construction. Africatown Heritage House is located at 2465 Wimbush St, Mobile, AL 36610.

Scheduling: School tours will only be scheduled for students in 4th grade and up. Tours must be scheduled at least two weeks in advance and are available starting at either 10:00am or 11:00am, Tuesday through Friday. Call (251) 206-5268 to make a reservation. School groups may bring a maximum of 50 visitors in one day. This number must include students, staff and chaperones. The Africatown Heritage House can only book one school tour per day. Please note that your field trip will include a visit to the Robert Hope Community Center next door for a classroom activity. Groups of more than 50 people will need to schedule multiple dates.

Admission: Schools located in Mobile County, Alabama receive free admission. The admission rate for schools located outside of Mobile County is \$8.00 per person.

Arrival: Upon arrival, buses will offload students in front of the Africatown Heritage House and then park at the Robert Hope Community Center next door to Africatown Heritage House. The entrance to the community center parking lot is located on Edwards Street.

Field Trip Schedule: Groups of more than 25 people will be divided into 2 groups and rotate among these two activities. A field trip will take a total of 2 hours to complete.

- Guided Tour of Africatown Heritage House-1 hour: A museum educator will take students on a guided tour of *Clotilda: The Exhibition* at Africatown Heritage House and the healing garden (if weather/time permits)
- Activity at the Robert Hope Community Center Activity- 1 hour: Students from elementary and middle schools will participate in a hands-on activity on the Yoruba, the cultural group that many of the survivors were from. High school students will watch a documentary about the voyage of the *Clotilda*, the survivors, and the development of Africatown.

Lunch: Weather permitting, school groups are welcome to eat outside on the lawn or in the park behind Africatown Heritage House. If it is raining, school groups can eat inside the Robert Hope Community Center.

SAMURAI: Sunrise, Sunset SEPTEMBER 27, 2024 — JANUARY 5, 2025

Drawing from the rich and varied Japanese collection of the Stibbert Museum in Florence, Italy, *Samurai: Sunrise, Sunset*, a traveling exhibition from Contemporanea Progetti, features some 100 objects related to the legendary samurai warriors. The exhibition includes full suits of samurai armor, helmets, swords, sword-guards, and saddles as well as exquisite objects intended for more personal use such as lacquered boxes, incense trays, and delicate vases that characterize the period from 1185 – 1868 in which Japan was ruled by the samurai military class that embodied the ideals of the code of Bushidō, "the way of the warrior."

Highlights of the exhibition include three exquisite helmets by Ryōei, one of Japan's most famous and talented helmet-makers. Only about 20 works attributed to Ryōei survive. Six of them are at the Museo Stibbert, in Florence, Italy, and three are on display in the exhibition. Other outstanding objects include a quiver entirely covered in flakes of Mother-of- pearl and iconic swords with grips made of stingray skin.

PAINTED PAGES: Illuminated Manuscripts, 13th – 18th Centuries JANUARY 10 – MAY 25, 2025

This traveling exhibition, from the collection of the Reading Public Museum in Reading, Pennsylvania, includes more than thirty-five works—some with elaborate gold leaf decoration and intricate ornament—from medieval Bibles, Prayer Books, Psalters, Books of Hours, Choir Books, Missals, Breviaries, and Lectionaries. Examples of the materials used by artists before the age of printed books to create these extraordinary pages are also featured in the exhibit. Most of the works date from the thirteenth through the eighteenth centuries and are created with ink on parchment or vellum (animal skin). French, Italian, Spanish, Dutch, Flemish, English, and German examples are included in the exhibition. Additionally, non-western sheets including a sumptuous seventeenth-century leaf from the Koran and pages from seventeenth- and eighteenth-century versions of the Shahnameh, the illustrated Persian Book of Kings, are included.
