## THE SEPTEMBER LEARNING LUNCH PROGRAM AT THE HISTORY MUSEUM OF MOBILE WILL FEATURE DR. TIMOTHY BUCKNER, ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF HISTORY AT TROY UNIVERSITY

The History Museum of Mobile will host its next Learning Lunch program on **Wednesday**, **September 11**, **2024**, **at 12pm**. It will feature **Dr. Timothy Buckner**, Associate Professor of History at Troy University. The topic of his presentation is *Race and Masculinity in William Johnson's Natchez*.

**Dr. Timothy R. Buckner** is an Associate Professor of History and Associate Chair of the Department of History and Philosophy at Troy University. His teaching and research focus is on race, slavery, and masculinity in the American South. He is the co-editor of the Journal of American History article titled, "Fathers, Preachers, Rebels, Men: Black Masculinity in U.S. History and Literature, 1820–1945," and the author of *The Barber of Natchez Reconsidered: William Johnson and Black Masculinity in the Antebellum South.* The book was the winner of the Jules and Frances Landry Award for 2023-2024.
